Tahpanes (v. 7) was a fortress city on the border of northern Egypt. **Pharaoh's palace** (v. 9) must have been a secondary palace where Pharaoh stayed when he was in Tahpanes. His main residence was in Elephantine in southern Egypt.

Jeremiah 44

When things go their way and all is well, most people say they've been *lucky*. How often do you attribute beneficial circumstances and events to God?

1. What were the Jews, who had escaped to Egypt, doing that provoked the Lord to anger against them (v. 8)?

2. By God's decree, how many Jews who fled to Egypt would ever return (v. 14)?

3. Who was taking the lead in burning incense to the idol called the *Queen of Heaven* (v. 15-17)? (a) the priests, (b) the women, (c) the men, (d) the young people.

4. What reasoning did the people use to justify their continued idol worship (v. 18)?

5. What sign would the people receive that God was going to punish them as he promised (vs. 29-30)?

1. When something unexpectedly wonderful happens to you, how do you usually explain it to others? (a) attribute it to good luck, (b) attribute it to God's gracious love, (c) attribute it to shrewd decisions on your part.

2. When life is going well for most of your friends, to what do they attribute it?

The Queen of Heaven (v. 17) most likely refers to Ishtar, the Babylonian goddess of love and fertility. Her Greek name was Astarte. She was the goddess of war and love, and represented female fertility.

3. Even though you may not fulfill your secret ambition, how has God blessed your life in other ways?



Baruch, son of Neriah (v. 1), Jeremiah's secretary, came from an influential family of noble birth, and was the grandson of Mahseiah, who was governor of Jerusalem during the reign of Josiah (2Ch 34:8). His brother had been chief chamberlain in the court of Zedekiah (Jer 51:59). Baruch may have had ambitions of attaining a high office, or even the prophetic office. God knew the secret things of Baruch's heart and the reason for his complaining.

“This is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says to you, Baruch...

“Should you then seek great things for yourself? Seek them not. For I will bring disaster on all people, declares the Lord, but wherever you go I will let you escape with your life.””

Pharaoh Neco (v. 2) killed Josiah, King of Judah, in 609 B.C. In 605 B.C. Neco's army was defeated at Carchemish by Nebuchadnezzar and his Babylonian army. Nebuchadnezzar would not invade Egypt until 571-567 B.C.

Flood Warnings

Jeremiah 47

Because a specific **Pharaoh** is not named in verse 1, several possibilities have been suggested. Some see this as Pharaoh Neco, who conquered the Philistines at Gaza when he defeated King Josiah at Megiddo. Others see this as Neco when he was returning from his defeat at Carchemish. Another explanation is that this is Pharaoh Hophra, who conquered Gaza when he fought against Tyre and Sidon. **“Waters...in the north”** (v. 2). Flood waters are often used as imagery. In this case they describe an invading army that is seen as unstoppable. **Cutting oneself** (v. 5) was a pagan act of humiliation to seek a god’s favor.



“This is what the Lord says: ‘See how the waters are rising in the north; they will become an overflowing torrent. They will overflow the land and everything in it, the towns and those who live in them. The people will cry out; all who dwell in the land will wail . . . ’”
