### Grace and Peace, dear CWR/PTM Friend and Partner,

Te're grateful that in his infinite kindness, <u>God has seen fit to make us partners in the gospel of Jesus Christ that truly is good news</u>. And what is that good news? That God has revealed himself through Christ's life, death and resurrection—that the triune **God is infinite and all-embracing love in his very essence**. In Jesus, we come to know God as self-giving, radically forgiving and co-suffering love. By the grace of God, we are able to dismiss toxic images of God as the punitive tyrant, the absentee parent or the divine vending machine.

You might remember these themes ringing through the pages of A More Christlike God: A More Beautiful Gospel, released by CWR Press in 2016. Thanks in great part to your support, more than 10,000 copies have found their way into people's homes, seminary and university classrooms and into the Dutch and German languages! Just recently a publisher contacted us about printing A More Christlike God in yet another language spoken by hundreds of millions. Earlier this year, PTM was pleased to announce the release of A More Christlike God in audio-book format and response has been excellent.

Now we're about ready to publish a sequel, A More Christlike Way: A More Beautiful Faith. Like Paul's epistles, which often begin with theology and move to application, A More Christlike Way puts feet to the theology of A More Christlike God.

But, this two-volume series is more than doctrine (Vol. 1) and practice (Vol. 2). If viewed from that perspective then it would seem like the first book is about God and the second is about us. Better stated, A More Christlike God is about Christ's divine nature and A More Christlike Way is about Christ's human nature.

Of course, we're still talking about one Person. It's not like Jesus threw on the God-switch for displays of miraculous power and then pressed the human-button to reveal his vulnerability and suffering. Not at all! As one ancient author put it, Jesus did human things divinely and divine things humanly. In Christ, we see God himself walking (with actual feet) the long and arduous Jesus Way—all the way to Golgotha and beyond!

As we journey the *More Christlike Way*, we're not merely speaking of applying good theology to our daily lives. We're responding to a call—to Jesus' call: ""Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24).

We're beckoned to walk in the footsteps of Christ, empowered by the transforming grace of the Holy Spirit. Thus, while we do hope to apply the life of Christ to our own path, this is not another Christian how-to book. In the end, it's all about the Jesus Way of Abba's love and how he (not we) lived it perfectly.

On that note, allow me to share a short excerpt from the book, a taste-test if you like, reinforcing what I've just shared:

Jesus alone created the Jesus Way and walked it perfectly.

Each of the attributes I will use to describe the Jesus Way—for example, radical forgiveness, radical hospitality, radical inclusion—describe Jesus, not me and not the church.

Here's the problem: Jesus said, "Take up your cross and follow me," which is to say, "Imitate me." Largely, we don't. And the harder we try, the more we fail. Miserably. A rule of thumb: the deeper our religious zeal, the further we stray from Christ—just ask Saul of Tarsus! No, we don't become Christlike by willing ourselves into radical discipleship.

Whatever forays we do make along the Jesus Way occur by locking our gaze, not on our performance, but on Jesus. We must look ahead, to Jesus. He is the one who carved out the path for faith, and he's the one who brought it to completion (see Hebrews 12:2).

When "the Word became flesh," God's unexpected and total identification with humanity opened a road, a path, a Way for all of us. That Way is Jesus' path back to Abba's house, our return home to paradise. By the indwelling grace of triune Love, those who surrender to Abba as Jesus did are empowered to walk as he walked. As Paul said,

I have been crucified with the Messiah. I am, however, alive—but it isn't me any longer; it's the Messiah who lives in me. And the life I do still live in the flesh, I live within the faithfulness of the son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me (Galatians 2:19b-20 NTE).

We live, we walk, we imitate the Jesus Way "within the faithfulness of the son of God." I love that. Whatever steps we take into a more Christlike faith occur because Christ lives in us and we (somehow) live in him—in the grace of now.

I cannot overstate this: this book could be—but must not be—mistaken for a manifesto. It is not a set of ideals we strive after or laws we live up to. Believe me: straining to achieve Christlikeness through self-will only leads to despondency (failure and disappointment) or to pride (zealotry and hypocrisy). The Jesus Way is a surely a struggle, but one engaged not by striving, but by surrender.

Of course, A More Christlike Way will also include many stories and testimonies, practical considerations and thought-provoking questions. Most of all, the message of A More Christlike God and A More Christlike Way are foundational to the mission and objectives of CWR/PTM—reaching out to people around the world with a Christ-centered message of God's love and grace.

P.P.S. With our worldwide ministry in mind, here are two "thank-you's" we recently received:


